Music Performance Notes

If possible, it is suggested that the children be divided into three groups: the Angel Choir, Cosmic Choir and Animal Choir. If the group is too small to divide, the children may change costumes and serve as singers for all three of the above choirs. "Chorus" indicates all choirs.

The "Salzburg Stomp," used in *It's Good* and *Make a Joyful Noise*, comes from Carl Orff's body percussion. It is accomplished by standing in an upright position, keeping one leg and foot stationary while bending the other back at the knee, and bringing the calf and foot forward in a kicking movement, stopping the motion near the stationary foot on which one is standing. This action can be done quickly. (Try to avoid the "Bug Stomp," in which the whole leg is lifted from the hip and brought down—sometimes on the bodies of unfortunate insects!—with great force.)

Production Suggestions: Stage and Sets

Divide the stage into two sections: Heaven and the void. If possible, elevate the heavens in the back of the stage, and have the void below it in front.

Production Suggestions: Props

Beach balls, kickballs, tennis balls, etc. can be painted to resemble planets, moons, suns, etc. Children may instead be costumed as planets wearing sandwich boards: cardboard shapes of suns, moons, stars, comets, asteroids, etc.

Fish bowl or large glass or clear plastic container (filled with water and sand)

Snorkel, fins, and diving mask (for diver)

Potted plants

Production Suggestions: Costumes

It is strongly recommended (especially for smaller groups who will use the same children interchangeably for the Angel Choir, Cosmic Choir, and Animal Choir) that costumes be kept simple. Be creative and use what works best for your group. The following are some suggestions:

Angels can be clothed in oversized white T-shirts and shorts, with the requisite wings made of cardboard or wire coat hangers and tulle (netting). Angel halos can be made from chenille pipe cleaners.

For animal costumes, the children may wear painters' hats or baseball caps with the appropriate animal on them. Oversized, solid-colored T-shirts, or simple tunics with animals appliquéd in felt may also serve.

Adam and Eve can appear in T-shirts and sweat pants with added fig leaves in the appropriate places to add a little whimsy!




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

Scene 3: Earth and Water

MICHAEL: (Bringing in a fishbowl full of water and sand) What IS this stuff?

GOD: A sample from the third planet from that sun over there. Interesting, isn't it?

GABRIEL: (With hand in the fishbowl) This feels . . . wet.

GOD: Oh yes, that's water. Powerful stuff when used in quantity.

GABRIEL: (Feeling the sand) What's this?

GOD: That's earth, or at least one kind of it.

MICHAEL: I don't see any of it down there.

GOD: That's because it's all under water. But, if we keep the water in some kind of

boundary on the earth . . .

GABRIEL: What will happen?

GOD: We'll have dry land and seas. So be it! Waves, draw back and stay within the

boundaries I set for you. Land, be dry and keep the water in its pools.

(The DIVER enters, dressed in swim suit, and fins, snorkel and mask, if possible.)

DIVER: Who turned off the water?

ALL: What?

DIVER: Somebody must have pulled the plug! I was swimming down on the earth, and

all of a sudden I was flat on my back, looking up.

GOD: I'm sorry. I wanted some dry land on that planet.

DIVER: Can I still swim there?

GOD: Of course. Just find a place where there's plenty of water. I promise I won't

move it this time.

DIVER: All right, 'Bye.

GOD: We'll see you later. (The DIVER walks off, practicing swimming technique.)

That's enough for today.

(Curtain. GOD and the rest of the cast move from the heavens down to the earth.)




