Esther Synopsis

The book of Esther, chapters 2-8

Esther is set in the Citadel of Susa, a capitol of the Persian Empire (present-day Iran). The king of the citadel was named Ahasuerus (*uh-has-you-air-us*). King Ahasuerus had become displeased with his wife, Vashti, so he banished her from Susa and began searching for a new wife. Each available young woman in the kingdom was to present the king with a gift of their choice, and the king would then choose his wife. All the young women were prepared by Hegai and Shaashgaz, the king's servants.

At that time, Mordecai was a Jewish man living in the Citadel of Susa. Mordecai was in the king's good favor, for he had saved the king's life by alerting him of an assassination attempt by gatekeepers Bigthan and Teresh. Mordecai raised his cousin, Esther (whose parents had died), as his own child, and she was among the young women who were candidates to become queen. When Esther appeared before the king, he loved her the most and chose her to be his wife. King Ahasuerus did not know Esther was a Jew.

Soon after this, the king promoted a man named Haman to be his second-in-command. When Haman would ride his horse down the street all the people would bow to him except for Mordecai, who would bow to no one but his God. This enraged Haman and he plotted against the Jews, making a plan to destroy all of them throughout the Persian Empire. He manipulated the king to gain approval for his plan.

Mordecai tore his robes and put on sackcloth and ashes upon hearing this news. He warned Esther that all Jews (including her) would be killed...and only Esther could stop it from happening. She had to talk with the king. However, Esther was not permitted to see the king unless he asked for her, and if she went on her own accord, she could be put to death. Esther was terrified of this, but she made a plan. Esther requested a banquet with the king and Haman. Meanwhile, Haman ordered a stockade built to humiliate Mordecai.

That night, the king called Haman and asked, "What should be done for the man whom the king delights to honor?" Haman selfishly assumed the king meant to honor him, so he said that the man should wear a royal robe and be led on one of the king's horses through the city streets, with one proclaiming: "This is what is done for the man the king delights to honor!" The king thought this was good, and proceeded to ask Haman to lead Mordecai through the streets in this way in order to honor him for previously warning the king of a plot against him.

Esther requested a second banquet with the king and Haman. During this banquet, Esther told the king of Haman's plan to massacre the Jews in the Persian Empire and acknowledged her own Jewish ethnicity. The king was enraged and ordered Haman to suffer in the stockade he had built for Mordecai. The king appointed Mordecai as his second-in-command, and the Jewish people were saved.

The Cast of Characters

Singing and Speaking Roles

MORDECAI – a Jewish man living in the Citadel of Susa

ESTHER – Mordecai's cousin and eventual queen

HAMAN – King Ahasuerus' second-in-command

Speaking-Only Roles

NARRATOR – split this role into multiple NARRATORS if you have a large cast

KING AHASUERUS – the king of the Citadel of Susa

HEGAI – the host of the king's singing contest

SHAASHGAZ – the judge of the king's singing contest, a pessimistic sourpuss

CONTESTANT #1 – the first to audition to become queen, very flaky

BIGTHAN – the king's gatekeeper, plans assassination attempt

TERESH – another gatekeeper, a bit slow

KEEPER OF THE RECORDS – the king's record keeper and historian, very dry

Singing-Only Roles

KING'S HERALDS (2-3) – small ensemble in "King Ahasuerus Seeks a Wife"

CONTESTANT #2 – soloist in "Fluffy the Camel," very self-confident

SOLOISTS (4) – optional soloist roles are included in "The Citadel of Susa" and Citadel Reprises I, II, III

Non-Speaking and Non-Singing Roles

STAGEHAND – in charge of removing the bad acts from the stage during the singing contest

FLUFFY THE CAMEL (1-2, depending on the costume) – CONTESTANT #2's pet

KING'S GUARDS (2) – the king's personal body guards

CASTLE CATERERS (2-3) – responsible for setting up Esther's banquets

Optional Dancing Roles

SACKCLOTH DANCER – an optional dancer for "A Dark Day Arrives"

FINALE DANCERS (5-6) – an ensemble of optional dancers for "In Your Hands (Finale)"

Production Notes

Set Design

This musical set can be as simple or elaborate as you wish. The scenes take place in one of two places: in the city square or at the castle. To change from the city square to the castle, you can simply add a throne for the king, a table beside it for the Book of Records, and a gate to designate the castle limits.

Costumes

Use what you have on hand – solid-color robes or frocks for the CHOIR, MORDECAL and ESTHER; a kingly robe and crown for KING AHASUERUS, helmets and shields for the KING'S GUARDS, a gold- or royal-colored robe or accessory for ESTHER once she becomes queen. Burlap belts or overlays can be added to the CHOIR's costumes during "A Dark Day Arrives." The only costume you may need to enlist help to create: Fluffy the Camel!

As the music vamps and during the NARRATOR's next line, we move from the city square to the castle,

man named Ahasuerus. He had recently become displeased with his wife, Vashti, and had

Music begins for "You May Be a Queen" and vamps as the dialogue continues.


ESTHER: Oh, Cousin Mordecai, you're just saying that to be kind. I'm just ... well ... I'm common.



HEGAI: At least we know she is not lip-syncing.

SHAASHGAZ: I kind of wish she was... Come on, let's go...

The accompanist plays "Contestant #1 Intro" again. CONTESTANT #1 takes a deep breath, but dissolves into another giggle fit.

SHAASHGAZ: All right! That's enough.

KING AHASUERUS claps his hands and the STAGEHAND hooks cane around CONTESTANT #1 to pull her offstage.

HEGAI: Wow, Shaashgaz. A major disappointment.

SHAASHGAZ: Disappointment?? Hegai, there are no words in my vocabulary to describe how terrible that

was. At least it was mercifully short.

HEGAI: Well, let's move on to Contestant #2.

CONTESTANT #2 enters with her camel, FLUFFY, in tow. She begins to sing while FLUFFY dances.
