Jann Aldredge-Clanton and Larry Schultz perceptively understand that transforming the church's language for God can profitably begin with children, whose imaginations are less bound to traditional images. Exploring the breadth of biblical metaphors, this winsome musical offers a fresh vision of the Triune God who reveals self in all of creation, especially through human creatures who share the divine imagination.

Although there have been a number of recent hymns exploring new images for God, such texts have usually been geared for adults, while bymns and anthems for children have continued to use a more limited stock of titles and metaphors mistakenly regarded as an appropriate expression of tradition.

In this fresh and creative musical, author and composer make available a more comprehensive range of biblical images, celebrating both God and humanity in language that has been too long neglected. In doing so, they have helped to prepare the children who perform it and the audiences who attend it for greater appreciation and understanding of the images they will encounter in much new hymnody. In fact, several of the pieces in this musical could well be used as anthems interspersed in a hymn festival exploring the images of God being recovered and developed in recent hymns.

Preface

Exploring...

Our Milky Way Galaxy contains over a hundred billion stars. The Milky Way is only one of bundreds of billions of galaxies in the universe. The Creator of so vast a universe exceeds all our thoughts and words. All our language for God must then be metaphorical. Biblical revelation gives a multiplicity of divine images to suggest the vastness and all-inclusiveness of our Creator. The more we teach children these names and images, the fuller their experience of God will be, and the more they will believe themselves to be created in God's image. Imagine God! is a musical designed to give children a wide variety of divine images and invite them to use the wonderful gift of their own imaginations to imagine more.

God created male and female in the divine image (Genesis 1:27). Although the image of God implies much more, the first chapter of Genesis makes clear that femaleness and maleness are in some way part of God's nature. Since male and female are created in the image of God, God's image includes both male and female, although much of our worship and Bible teaching give children the impression that God is exclusively male. This mustcal includes feminine along with masculine divine names to instill the belief that girls as well as boys are created in the image of God, and that girls and boys are equally valued by God.

Imagine God! also teaches children that God is much greater than everything and everyone they know. Through a variety of feminine, masculine, and non-gender images of God, this musical invites children and their teachers to imagine a God who is both transcendent and immanent, to believe that the great Creator of the universe lives within them. It is our hope that Imagine God! will contribute to an expansive theology of God and an ethic of equality and justice in human relationships.

This musical offers children a multi-sensory approach in expressing numerous images of God as revealed in the Bible, the natural world, each individual, and relationships with others. Along with the music and narrations included in this score, the companion Imagine God! Production Guide (CGBK65) provides ideas for creative art projects, dance and body prayer movement, multi-generational participation, Bible exploration, and ministry activities that will enhance the learning and presentation of Imagine God!

Composed with an eye to the goals of children's choir curricula, the music in this work is flexibly voiced and contains a variety of musical elements, meters and modes. This allows for the music to be successfully taught and included within the context of a progressive learning environment. With this in mind, consider preparing individual pieces and narrations for various services of worship throughout the year. Then, conclude the children's choir year by presenting the musical in its entirety. The projects and activities found in the Imagine God! Production Guide can be used in coordination with weekly rehearsals or to supplement a music camp experience.

May all who present Imagine God! find in it a means of naming, knowing, and loving God.

FEMALE CHILD: God is so much more than we can ever imagine. I've learned in church that God is so much greater than anything or anyone we've ever seen. Sometimes it just blows my mind to try to imagine God!

FEMALE ADULT: Yes, I feel that way too! But the Bible helps us to imagine God by giving us many different word-pictures. One of the pictures of God in the Bible is of a mother bird. God is like a mother eagle that teaches her young eagles to fly and to hunt their own food. When the little eagles are old enough to leave the nest, their mother shakes the nest and flutters her wings over them. Then she takes them on her wings to teach them to fly. When the mother thinks the young birds are ready, she swoops down to let them fly by themselves. But she stays close enough to swoop back under them and catch them if they're having trouble flying by themselves, or if they get too tired to continue flying on their own. (Deuteronomy 32:11-12)

MALE CHILD: I see! God is like the mother eagle, and we are like her young birds.

MALE ADULT: A picture of God in the Bible is of a shepherd. God takes care of us as a shepherd takes care of sheep. Jesus told a story about a shepherd who had one hundred sheep. He lost one of his sheep. Even though he had ninety-nine other sheep, he missed this one lost sheep. The shepherd cared deeply for this sheep. Surely he could do without this one little sheep if he had ninety-nine others. But no! This sheep was too important to him. So the shepherd left the others for a while to go and search for the lost sheep. The shepherd searched and searched until he found the lost sheep. When he found the lost sheep, the shepherd was so happy that he told all his friends and neighbors to celebrate with him. (Luke 15:3-6)

FEMALE When I imagine God like that shepherd and each of us like that little lost sheep, I CHILD: begin to feel how much God loves us and how important everyone is to God.

FEMALE CHILD: All of us are created in God's own image. Imagine that! In the beginning,

God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness." (*Genesis 1:26*) In the book of Genesis, we read that God created all people in God's image; male and female God created them. (*Genesis 1:26-27*) Since girls and boys, women and men are made in the image of God, God's image includes both male and female. So we can call God "He" and "She," "Mother

and Father," "Sister and Brother."

MALE CHILD: Yes! And God is so much greater than we can ever imagine or name. It's hard

to imagine that the great Creator of hundreds of billions of galaxies in the

universe knows each one of us by name and wants to relate to us.

TEENAGER: One of the ways we can know God is through our relationships with other

people. We can know God's love through our families and friends.

FEMALE ADULT: In the Bible, the prophet Isaiah reveals that God is like a loving mother who

not only gives birth to her children, but also comforts and nurtures them toward their full potential. (*Isaiah 66:13*) Isaiah also reveals that God is like a nursing mother whose relationship with her children is so strong that nothing can ever

break it. (*Isaiah 49:15*)

MALE ADULT: The Psalms sing of God who is like a tender father, loving and caring for his

children. (*Psalm 103:13*) The Gospels proclaim that God is like a gracious father who gives us freedom to learn from our experiences and offers

unconditional love when we make mistakes. (Luke 15:11-32)

ALL VOICES: Let's celebrate God's image and love known in each of us!



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FEMALE The Bible pictures God as Lady Wisdom, who gives long life and peace. The book of ADULT: Proverbs tells us that She is more precious than all the silver and gold and fine jewels in the world, and that She is like a "tree of life" to those who follow Her paths of peace and love and kindness. (*Proverbs 3:13-18*) Wisdom teaches us to do what is right and true. (*Proverbs 8:1-11*) She calls us to listen and learn from Her words of truth. (*Proverbs 1:20-23*)

MALE Some people make fun of Her teaching and do many hurtful things. But She keeps calling us to do right. Wisdom rewards those who follow Her teaching: "Prize Her highly, and She will exalt you; She will honor you if you embrace Her. She will place on your head a fair garland; She will bestow on you a beautiful crown."



FEMALE In the beginning God gave birth to the heavens and the earth. The Spirit of God moved ADULT: over the waters to bring forth light and life. (*Genesis 1:1-2*) In the Bible the word for Spirit is the Hebrew word *Ruah* [pronounced ROO-AH]. The word *Ruah* also means "breath." *Ruah* is the Breath of Life. *Ruah* gives life to us all. *Ruah* breathes Her life into everyone.

MALE The Gospel of John records Jesus' saying, "I am the Bread of Life: whoever comes to me ADULT: shall never hunger" (*John 6:35*), and "I am the Door." (*John 10:9*) Jesus is like an open door, welcoming everyone. Jesus wants us to welcome all people and to share his table of life with them. Jesus gives new life to us all. When we celebrate communion, we remember that Jesus is the Bread of Life, given for everyone.

FEMALE CHILD: Did you know that God is like a rock?

MALE CHILD: How can that be? A rock just sits there, saying nothing and doing nothing.

FEMALE CHILD: The Bible says that God is our Rock. (Psalm 31:3; 62:2)

MALE CHILD: So what does that mean?

FEMALE CHILD: I think it means that God is solid and secure *like* a rock *and* we can always depend on God. Of course, God is much more than a rock, but that's one picture that

helps us understand something of what God is like. The Bible also says that God

is like a rock who gave birth to us. (Deuteronomy 32:18)

MALE CHILD: So what does *that* mean?

FEMALE CHILD: I think it means that God is like the foundation of the world, the Creator of everything.

Like Rock and Light and Wind

MALE CHILD: Have the lights ever gone out in your house?

FEMALE CHILD: Yes, and we couldn't see anything! We stumbled around in the dark until we could find a candle.

MALE CHILD: What if there was no light in the whole world?

FEMALE CHILD: Then we wouldn't be able to see anything at all! It would be hard to know where we're going or what we're doing.

MALE CHILD: In the Bible, the psalmist writes that God is our Light and our Salvation. (*Psalm* 27:1) Jesus said, "I am the Light of the World." (*John* 8:12)

FEMALE CHILD: What do you think that means?

MALE CHILD: I think it means that God makes it possible for us to see and understand. And Jesus, the Light of the World, helps us find the right way.

FEMALE CHILD: Do you think that God could ever be like the wind?

MALE CHILD: The wind can be strong, and it can be a gentle breeze. I suppose God is like that, strong and gentle.

FEMALE CHILD: In the Bible, the Hebrew word for "Spirit", Ruah, also means "breath" and "wind."

MALE CHILD: Jesus said that the Spirit of God is like the wind. It blows where it chooses, and we hear it, but we don't know where it comes from or where it's going. (John 3:8)

FEMALE CHILD: Also in the Bible, we read that Elijah expected God to come in the wind, but instead God came in a "still small voice." (*I Kings 19:11-12*) But another time, the Spirit of God came "like the rush of a mighty wind." (*Acts 2:2*)

MALE CHILD: So I guess we can say that God sometimes comes in surprising, unexpected ways, like the wind.







MALE CHILD: God is a Friend to everyone, even those people who are made fun of or looked down on as not being good enough. God loves and cares for all people – girls and boys, men and women of all races in all occupations – no matter what we do or how we look. (Matthew 11:19)

FEMALE CHILD: God is a Friend who is always there for us. God calls us all "friends" and wants us to join as partners in loving and caring for everyone. (*John 15:12-15*)

FEMALE CHILD: It's fun to imagine what God is like.

MALE CHILD: Yes! I'm so glad God gave us imagination.

FEMALE CHILD: At night when I look up at the huge sky and see the moon and all the stars, I think about how great God is.

MALE CHILD: The bright red and gold trees in the fall and the shining yellow and pink wildflowers in the spring help me to imagine God.

FEMALE CHILD: The Bible says that nature shows us something of the glory of God. (*Psalm 19:1*; 104:24) God created everything, and we can see God everywhere if we really look.

MALE CHILD: In the book of Psalms we also read that God is far above the earth, (*Psalm 148:13*) and that God's love is higher than the heavens. (*Psalm 108:4*)

FEMALE CHILD: God is way above us, that's for sure.

MALE CHILD: But the Bible also says that God is in us. (*Ezekiel 36:27; Luke 17:21*) Can you imagine that? The great God who created everything and everyone in the whole world lives in you and me!

FEMALE CHILD: And we can feel God in us, especially when we love others and receive love from them.

MALE CHILD: Yes! One of the first verses in the Bible I ever learned was "God is Love." (*I John 4:8*) And God's love is like an open door, welcoming everyone.
